Drugsline Talk

During Year 12s Relationships and Sex Education Day (RSE), we were lucky enough to have an external speaker come in to talk to us about the harmful effects of drugs. Steven was an energetic and engaging speaker and used his personal stories to create a harrowing and informative experience.

The first part of the talk involved Steven telling us about the consequences of different drugs, explaining how easily it can ruin lives. All the stories were personal to Steven, since he works closely with addicts to get them back on track, it shocked us how quickly an addiction can start and how quickly it can take over lives. Whilst the stories were upsetting, it nonetheless reinforced the idea that it is never too



late and something can always be done. However, Steven made it clear that the problem can be solved completely if we refrain from taking drugs in the first place.

The second part of the talk was a workshop, where we were put in groups and had a scenario about a drug user living in East London. We had to decide where he was today and most of the groups decided he was dead. Conversely, Steven revealed that he had helped the drug user and they had even started working together, when he

suddenly disappeared without a trace. This highlighted to us that drugs have an ubiquitous presence and influence which is why it is so important to avoid them at all costs.

Steven wrote a letter after the session to say that we "ALL responded in such a positive way and it made the workshops even more enjoyable for me" and that we were all "respectful towards each other which says so much to me about all of you as individuals."

Overall, it was a powerful talk and will certainly stay with us as we continue into Year 13 and even university.

Citizenship Focus: Mental Health - Be MAGIC



This year, we have focussed on developing positive mental wellbeing and using "Be MAGIC" which coincides with the NHS Five Steps to Mental Wellbeing. We have been encouraging our young people to:

Be MINDFUL – it is important to be present and to have moments when we stop to become fully aware of our thoughts, our body and the world around us. Mindfulness can come in many forms from body scans and guided meditations (there are lots of excellent ones on YouTube), taking a walk in nature and/or listening to our favourite tracks but being fully present with these.

Be ACTIVE – it is not only great for your physical health and fitness, evidence also shows that it can improve your mental wellbeing by raising your self-esteem, helping you to set goals or challenges and achieve them and by causing chemical changes in your brain which can help to positively change your mood.

Be GENEROUS – this has been our termly focus and we have explored the evidence base behind the positive outcomes of generosity. We have looked at the evidence which shows that being generous can reduce stress, anxiety and depression. It can also improve selfesteem and inter-personal relationships

and help to build up feelings of positive mental wellbeing.

Be INTERESTED – taking up extracurricular activities or learning something new alone (not homework that they have to do!) can boost self-confidence and raise self-esteem; it can lead to better connections with others and give a sense of purpose to us.

Be CONNECTED – it is vital to have good relationships and relationships that are not screen-based only.

Questions for discussion:

Be MINDFUL – which of the following mindful activities would be beneficial to try on a regular basis:

- Mindful breathing e.g. square breathing, 5-4-3-2-1, wave breathing, finger breathing
- Body scan meditation
- Guided meditation
- Walks in nature
- Mindful colouring

Be ACTIVE – over summer, how will you continue to be active on a regular basis?

Be GENEROUS – what acts of generosity could you do over the summer? For example, cooking dinner for the family,

writing notes to relatives, donating to charity shops.

Be INTERESTED – is there something you could learn over summer? A new skill in a favourite hobby or something totally new?

Be CONNECTED – how will you stay connected to friends and family over summer?

Pre-election Visit by Angela Richardson

Angela Richardson, our local MP for Guildford, recently had the opportunity to engage with Year 12 students, offering them a unique insight into the world of politics and public service. She began the discussion by recounting her initial, unconventional steps into the UK's political sphere from the world of finance in New Zealand, providing the reasons she had for leaving the career she once had, in favour of an unfamiliar, and potentially volatile, environment.

It was particularly interesting to hear about the process of becoming a politician, which included active participation in grassroots organisations within communities, such as local councils. Furthermore, her account of the rigorous selection process to become an MP candidate and the subsequent challenges of competing in a marginal seat (winning by 3337 seats in the 2019 election) highlighted the hard work required to achieve a successful career in politics.

Following on from this, Angela Richardson transitioned to addressing the Conservative Party's future policies, on both a national and local level. In particular, she aimed to provide answers to questions given by the students, such as whether the controversial Safety of Rwanda Bill is an ethically viable method of tackling unauthorised entry into the UK. Additionally, following questions about the proposed introduction of National Service, Mrs Richardson attempted to clear up any misconceptions about the scheme



itself and the reality of the 12-month military programme that will become available if the Conservatives win the July election.

Finally, the discussion ended on Angela's thoughts whether rival parties such as Reform UK will have an impact on splitting the traditionally Conservative vote, in light of Nigel Farage's announcement to stand in the next election. She argued that despite a recent, rapid rise in favour of Reform UK in the polls, their lack of distinct policies beyond the topic of immigration will mean that they will fail to have a considerable long term impact on the state of British politics.

In conclusion, irrespective of whether students agreed with general Conservative views, developing an understanding of Mrs Richardson's reasoning in policymaking was an incredibly valuable experience for everyone involved. Not only did the session demystify what it takes to become a politician, but it also provided an outlet for students to voice their concerns in the run up to the next election. Jakub 12KO

Exciting Author Visit: Ally Sherrick Inspires Year 7 Students

Known for her captivating historical fiction novels, Ally spent the morning sharing her journey into becoming a writer; her historical inspirations, alongside how her novels move from ideas in her notebook to published pieces of literature.

Discovering the Writer's Journey - Ally began her visit with an engaging and interactive discussion about her journey as a writer. She shared with students her first published piece of work, which was a beautiful poem, written by her as a child about bonfire night. Throughout the morning, she shared how she overcame several challenges, but found a true passion for reading and storytelling, through believing in herself and support of family. Ally discussed she how overcame obstacles to write inspiring texts, steeped in history, ranging from heroines fighting injustices during the Roman Empire, to the brave and courageous protagonists protecting the treasures of British History during

Gold DofE Expedition

After a four-hour drive, we arrived at the beautiful location for our Gold DofE Expedition base camp: Llangors Lake in South Wales, Bannau Brycheiniog (The Brecon Beacons). It was late afternoon on Wednesday 10th July and immediately our students set about putting up tents and cooking themselves dinner. From the outset, our amazing students stepped up to the mark demonstrating exceptional campcraft skills and culinary skills.

It was an early start on the Thursday morning for the Year 13s on their assessed expedition. Leaving base camp at 8am to be shuttled out by minibus to their chosen starting destinations spread out across the national park.

The Year 12s had a more leisurely time that morning enjoying a lie in and some mid-morning team building games. The team building was hosted by Mr Bell whose years of outdoor education experience soon had the students tangled in knots and stuck on shrinking islands.

Then proceeded four days of navigation, walking and camping across the national park of Bannau Brycheiniog with elevation of up to 800m in places and carrying a full expedition rucksack with everything they need to survive on their backs. I was chatting to a couple of our Year 13 students, who I am sure

will not mind me saying that a week prior to departure, came to speak to me expressing that they were nervous and did not think they could do it.
When I spoke to them afterwards on Sunday evening, they had experienced life changing memories up on the Welsh mountains. They had realised how strong they were and said to me 'there is something very simple about getting up every morning and walking to a destination without distraction or our phones and the complication of life, I think I actually want to come out and walk in my free time.'

The weather this year was kind in comparison to last year's challenging 80mph winds and biblical rainstorms. The students were treated to exceptional views across some of the most spectacular countryside Wales has to offer. It is wonderful to hear our external DofE assessors tell me that our students are some of the most polite and considerate students they have ever worked with and that they love working with St Peter's - they are already looking forward to next year's expedition!

This expedition, and all of our expeditions, would not happen if it was not for the support of volunteering teaching staff giving up their own personal time. Special thanks to Mr Oldfield, Mrs Cooper, Miss Resa, Mr Bell, Miss Byrne, Mr Paterson-Spir and Mr

Bates. Special thanks to our external DofE assessor team John, Nick, Carmine and Steve.

Special recognition must be given to Mr Oldfield who is retiring this summer after ten years of establishing Gold DofE here at St Peter's. He will be greatly missed. I have been fortunate to have been mentored by him this year and I am hopeful we will continue his passion and inspiration. He is away to Spain in his campervan, but I am hopeful we will bump into him in the Welsh valleys in the future.

Of course, none of this would be allowed to happen if it was not for the support of our School Leadership Team in seeing the value of our DofE Wilderness Programme for our students. Thank you to all the teaching staff who covered our lessons whilst we were away and our amazing Finance, Admin and Site teams who help us with the logistics of planning and organising a trip. School Trips...

Year 8 Trip to Queen Elizabeth Country Park



Across two days in mid-June, over 200 Year 8 students visited Queen Elizabeth Country Park (QECP) for their geography field trip.

Students investigated the question: What impact do visitors have on QECP? After learning about the importance of UK National Parks (QECP is within the South Downs National Park), students set about investigating their key question using a range of primary data collection

methods. Students surveyed the visitor amenities, carried out environmental quality surveys, annotated photographs, drew a field sketch and completed a questionnaire.

Back in the classroom, students presented their environmental quality survey results using radar graphs and created word clouds to show the results of their questionnaires. Practising investigation skills at Key Stage 3 is an important preparation for GCSE and A Level Geography.

Year IO Field Trip to Stratford

At the beginning of June, Year 10 GCSE Geography students went on their first field trip to Stratford in East London. The students used a range of data collection techniques to compare how the quality of the environment varied between areas which were regenerated during and after the 2012 Olympic Games, and those which are currently being modernised.



One of our major case studies is urban change in London and students also need to cite an example of a regeneration scheme, therefore, visiting the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park was very beneficial.

Back in the classroom, students presented, analysed and evaluated their data. Next term, in Year 11, the geographers will be heading to West Wittering to complete their physical geography fieldwork.

School Trips...



A Level Field Trip

In July, the A Level Geographers spent four days in Guildford, London and Kent investigating a range of physical and human topics. Fieldwork is a compulsory requirement of the A Level course; it is also an opportunity to build relationships and enjoy being in the field.
